

Overall Satisfaction

Considering everything, most Region 7 respondents reported that they were satisfied with their job (4 on a 5-point Likert scale). The statewide average was also 4.

Region 7 Accomplishments

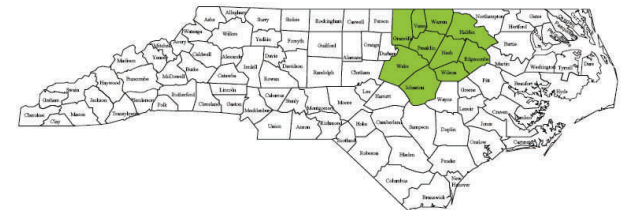
Region 7 respondents either agreed or strongly agreed with the following statements:

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The Respondents

In Region 7, there were **54** respondents out of 114 in the region (47% response rate). The demographic results are:

- **Supervisors:** 10
- **EHSs:** 44
 - OSWW** 23
 - F&L** 15
 - Surface Water Protection** 3
 - Wells** 3

34 **males** and 20 **females** responded. 89% described themselves as **Caucasian** and 6% as **African-American**. The most common **age group** reported was **30–34**. Many (34%) had degrees in **biological science** and 26% had a B.S. in **Environmental Health**. 5 of the 54 respondents held a Master's degrees (9%).



Respondents were also asked to list all of their job duties. Among other duties, they reported working in **Drinking Water Protection—Wells (56%), Migrant Housing Inspections (31%), Recreational Water — including Pools (26%) and Public Health Preparedness (22%)**.

The Reasons

Why do Environmental Health Specialists work in their current job?

Here's what Region 7 said:

1. I can work independently (85%)
2. I believe in protecting the environment (70%)
3. I enjoy working outdoors (63%)
4. I enjoy working with the public (63%)
5. I wanted to work good coworkers (56%)

NOTE: All information was self-reported via an on-line survey. None of the information, including salaries, was verified by any other means.

Experience

Similar to the statewide numbers, many (41%) in Region 7 have been working as an EHS in North Carolina for **5 years or less**.



Intentions

A majority (54%) of EHSs in Region 7 intend to stay in Environmental Health for their entire professional career, lower than the state average of 61%. About 22% are considering leaving Environmental Health as a field in the next 1–5 years. The following is a list of reasons for leaving the field:

1. Lack of career advancement opportunities (33%)
2. Poor or inadequate salary (28%)

None of the 54 intends to **change geographic locations** in the next year. However, 16 (30%) intend to **change geographic locations** in the next 1–5 years.

Importance and Satisfaction

Many Region 7 respondents **strongly agreed** that the following were **important** to them:

1. A good benefits package (80%)
2. A salary consistent with workload (80%)
3. A good balance between family and work (70%)
4. Being adequately prepared for the job (65%)

Of the 47 satisfaction questions, 4 items stood out receiving 1 or 2 on a 5-point Likert scale. Respondents were dissatisfied with:

1. Bonus structure (44%)
2. Level of staffing (44%)
3. Salary in relation to workload (43%)
4. Opportunities for promotion (28%)

A Question of Salary

The results of the salary question are presented here in 3 different ways. The first is **Specialist salary** by years of experience (no Supervisors) comparing the State with Region 7:

* The mode is the most commonly chosen value.

**There were not enough respondents to calculate an average for this group.

The following is **Supervisor salary** by years of experience (Statewide only):

Years of Practice	Statewide Supervisor Salary (Median)***
0–5 years	\$47,500–\$49,999
6–10 years	\$45,000–\$47,499
11–15 years	\$52,500–\$54,999
16–20 years	\$52,500–\$54,999
> 20 years	\$60,000–\$62,499

*** The median is the middle value with half the values falling above it and half falling below it.

Finally, respondents were asked what they thought an adequate salary was for an EHS with 5 years of experience. The most common answer for Region 7 was **\$40,000–\$42,499**; the average statewide response was also **\$40,000–\$42,499**.
